Big Trip Offerings 2014 -by Chance Cardamone-Knewstub

We're pleased to announce the three big trips we plan to offer for next year. Two of the trips are old standbys and one is a brand new adventure. Our "Big Trip" program is a key way in which we endeavor to fulfill the global component of our mission. On these trips, students will be able to meet and speak with film makers from around the world (Sundance), hike through Irish history, and do home stays in a Maya village in Belize. We know that these trips are expensive and entail great deal of effort and sacrifice on the parts of parents, students, and teachers but we believe that they are worth every bit of it. I can't tell you how many times I've heard students wishing that they were going to Sundance/Belize/whatever trip we're offering, and rue the fact that they had not taken the time to apply. If you have any interest whatsoever, you should be applying; you can always decide not to participate later, but you can't apply later.

Answers to few common questions: Yes, you can apply to more than one trip. Simply indicate your order of preference. If you are not accepted to your first choice, you will automatically be considered for your second. Yes, it is possible (although rare) to participate in more than one trip but only if by doing so you are not precluding someone else from participating in any trip If you do end up on one of these trips, please remember that the main reason we announce these so far ahead of time is so that you – the student - can make some decisions about your priorities. This summer is your best opportunity to earn some or all of the cost of the trip. So, look at these trips, talk to your parents, and apply. 
Ireland: Immerse yourself in the vibrant culture and landscape of southwestern Ireland as you hike along the Dingle Way! Each day we will walk about ten to twelve miles on this marked footpath, ambling along rocky coastlines, through farmland, and small towns, spending our nights in hostels and bed and breakfasts. We will also spend time learning about Irish culture, ecology, literature, and history, taking lessons in traditional dancing, language-learning, as well as listening to tales told by a professional storyteller. Other activities include exploring ancient ruins with a local guide, horseback riding, and kayaking in the Dingle Bay. We also plan on hiking Mt. Brandon, Ireland's second highest peak, a stunning mountain perched on the edge of the Dingle peninsula. Leaders: Peter Goff and Christie Beveridge—May 2014



Sundance: An Encounter Week trip to the Sundance Film Festival begins by flying into Salt Lake City, with a stunning view of the snow capped Wasatch Mountain Range. After a 35 minute drive to Park City, we don't lose much time setting up the condo, stocking it with food, and wait-listing our first film. Thus a week rich in all aspects of film making is launched; each morning, we enjoy the camaraderie of breakfast and a coffee stop at 7, followed by our first film by 9 a.m. As a reflection of the VCS Mission, we have embraced a festival with an environmental and global mission, as well as the local Native American culture. Belize: Mark and Jen are thrilled to be offering the Belize trip again! This trip is open to next year's sophomores, juniors, and seniors. Each of the eleven days in Belize will be packed with educational and experiential activities with a focus on tropical ecology and Belizean culture. A typical day in the rainforest will include waking to howler monkeys, hiking with a local guide, swimming in the Bladen River, discussing ecology with scientists, helping researchers, and relaxing in hammocks. In the Maya village we will tour cacao orchards and make chocolate, play soccer with the local children, and visit with our host families. Other highlights include hiking barefoot for six miles on a wet clay road from savannah to rainforest, snorkeling in Belize's coral reef, and dancing to the Sambai drums in a maroon Creole village.
