# International Students are on the way! -by Peter Gilmore



## World Language Student Work-by Jeiru Wang



Vermont Foreign Language Association holds 2013 Essay Contest in elementary school, middle school and high school. Students are required to write their essay in English and compose a short 75 word autobiography or profile in their target language to accompany their essays. For high school students, the title is *Many Languages, One United Voice.* Two 9<sup>th</sup> graders from Chinese II class, **Camille Bartsch and Jordan Cannon,** participated in the contest. They sent out their essay, on March 15th. Hope we can hear the trumpet soon.

We Are All One, The Only One —by Camille Bartsch

If we want Many Languages, with One United Voice, what will it take for us to achieve this goal? Through international diplomacy, nations can respect each other for our differences and our strengths. The United States wants to be the leader, bringing all languages and nations together; however, we must realize that America will not have the last word in all peace talks. Our international diplomacy will learn and grow from the respect that we show to regions of the world including: Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

Europe is filled with forward thinking movements in alternative energy such as a greater use of solar, wind and hydro energy. The Europeans have also been able to serve their people incredibly well when it comes to health care. Through our diplomats, the United States must be open to hearing new ideas, and it's how we learn to respect these different viewpoints that we establish a more united voice.

Asia's economy, infrastructure, and middle class are rising right now. Even though our relations with Asia are a bit tense based upon different views on government, we have to respect and learn from them when it comes to rebuilding our economy and their focus on education to make the next generation stronger.

Finally, the Middle East is showing desire for change in their region. The United States needs to support these future leaders, while encouraging young American students to also push for improvements in their own government. We also need to teach our students how to respect others, and sometimes agree to disagree at times, but to always be diplomatic.

The Many Languages, One United Voice project is trying to bring fresh new forward-thinking concepts into a more united world. Through diplomacy, we can learn from other nations how we can support shared goals while taking a leadership role as a nation. There are many languages around the world; however, we can be one language of leadership and respect.

#### One World, One Voice—by Jordan Cannon


Three years ago, I went to Hong Kong's Chungking mansions, an apartment-like building filled with people from all over the world. As I walked through the crowded halls, listening to all the different languages and passing sari shops, African restaurants, and Chinese tailors, I felt like I was in a microcosm of the world. I only wished that I could understand the many languages I heard. In today's globalized world, it is especially important that students learn to communicate across cultures so that they can share ideas and learn from each other.

Students have a valuable opportunity to work toward one united voice by studying foreign languages at school. With just over a year of Chinese language study, I have already experienced the power of speaking across cultures. This past fall, my Chinese class went to Montreal to visit Chinatown and the Chinese garden. While there, our teacher sent us on a scavenger hunt. We had to use our language skills to find the items on our list. To our surprise, people understood us and helped us get the things we needed. Our ability to communicate in a foreign language made it possible for us to work together to solve a problem.

However, studying language is not enough to truly speak with one united voice. To communicate effectively, one must also understand other cultures. When I visited China, I was amazed by how much more open and friendly people were when I showed that I knew something about their culture.

Students can also work toward developing one united voice by interacting with people from other cultures. Right here in Vermont, I have connected with refugees from Nepal by helping them learn English. When they understood what I was saying and I understood what they were saying, we felt united.

The world is full of many voices, each offering different perspectives and ideas. Being able to understand these voices allows us to work together to creatively solve universal problems. Moreover, when we understand each other there is less chance of conflict. We all benefit from realizing we are one united voice.
