On March 28<sup>th</sup>, the VCS Spanish classes went to Montreal to explore the Latin side of the city. There, we explored two different Latino markets, Lima Limon and Sabor Latino, and purchased traditional foods such as tamales and Inca Kola. We had to use our Spanish skills to actually purchase the items and understand what the attendant was asking us. One of the owners offered us "manjarblanco" (super sweet!) and we asked her about the displays with food at the store. We got to sample tamales and empanadas right on the spot.

For lunch, we were handed a map and we were asked to walk to a Cuban café where we sampled three different meat dishes: ropa vieja (shredded pork with spices), bistec (a steak filet) and pollo al jugo (juicy chicken). All of them were accompanied by patacones, fried plantains, beans and rice, staples of Caribbean food. We asked many questions to the restaurant owner about his life in Montreal and in Cuba. We discovered that there is a substantial Hispanic population in Montreal and that they enjoy living in that multicultural city. After lunch, the students were allowed to wander around the city and explore more of the markets.

The last portion of the trip was spent in an art museum, looking at traditional Peruvian art and sculptures at the Museum of Fine Arts in downtown Montreal.

We gained a cultural experience, we spoke in Spanish all day, and we ate great food. It was a wonderful trip!



#### Congratulations Aidan and Nora! -by Jillian Casey



On Thursday, April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2013, Nora Hill and Aidan Villani-Holland participated in a symposium at the Doubletree Hotel in South Burlington where they presented a poster detailing fieldwork they had completed through RACC and EPSCoR. For this year's undergraduate research symposium, each group was assigned a particular river or stream in Vermont, and after taking samples and performing some tests, the students were tasked with creating a poster to represent their findings.

"We took soil and water samples, and then completed a research project using systems dynamic modeling about water chemistry in the Huntington River," said Nora Hill. "It was the first real field experience I've ever done, and having that experience was really beneficial."

At the symposium on April 4<sup>th</sup>, Aiden and Nora had to present their poster and field questions regarding their results and the overall experience. "I have always loved science," Aidan Villani-Holland said, "and this project included interesting field work and a presentation, which was really great."

"The teachers we have at VCS are absolutely wonderful," Nora said, "and working with Peter Goff on this project has really influenced my interest in science. He is such a mentor and inspiration to me."

For their thorough research, their poster, and their ability to field questions from professors and world-renown researchers, Nora and Aidan won the Best High School Poster Presentation Award at the symposium, besting nearly fifty other high schools from Vermont, New York, and even Puerto Rico.





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
