

But I have to learn myself experience, feel. You've spent your life protecting me It's time to let go.



# Common Hour Speaker— Emily Unger

Emily Unger '07 spoke during the first Common Hour of the month on May 1st. Emily was a double major at Dartmouth, biology and anthropology with a focus in public health. She left VCS with an interest in biology, primarily ecology due to some of the great classes she took here, but she also liked the idea of studying medicine, combining science with anthropology. Emily graduated from Dartmouth in 2012, but as an undergraduate she studied in Costa Rica and the Cayman Islands, then did a semester in Ghana, West Africa interning at a maternity hospital.

Until the end of January 2013, Emily was doing research at Dartmouth primarily on Native American health care systems and how we can improve them in the United States. She was also a photographer and had the chance to travel and take pictures of Dartmouth students participating in study abroad experiences. Emily took two months off to study for the MCATs for medical school, and her current interest is in women's health as well as public health in underdeveloped settings.



### 8th Graders Hike Mount Philo— Luke Donforth



On April 18th, our 8th grade Flying Turtles took to the hills to search for signs of spring while investigating local geological features. We spent the morning hiking up Mount Philo, an excellent example of Cambrian metamorphic quartzite (~520,000,000 years old) thrusting up through the Ordovician sedimentary shale (~480,000,000 years old) that covers much of Charlotte. In addition to discussing the rocks and features that we encountered on the hike, we used the fabulous view from the top to look out at the Vermont landscape and discuss larger scale geological processes.
