Over the weeks between February and Spring breaks, students and teachers were challenged to create solutions to some problem in the world through artistic, technological, or social designs. They could work individually or in teams and could work on any problem of interest to them.

Those taking up the challenge had to make their initial three-minute pitches on April 1st, after which they had the remaining weeks before Spring Break to revise and complete their designs and get as far into either a build or implementation of their project as possible.

Through an incredible pool of ingenuity, the following participants in this design challenge earned top honors. First place went to Stefan Brecher for his build-out of flush

wall-mounted retractable seating. Second place went to Zelda Ferris and Jill Lamberson for their creation of an educational website on body image disorder in boys (see <http://boys2kendolls.com/>). Third place went to Camille Bartsch for her design and mock-up of a backpack for children in developing countries in which to carry water that is APA-compliant for load-bearing, rather than the traditional jerry can.
